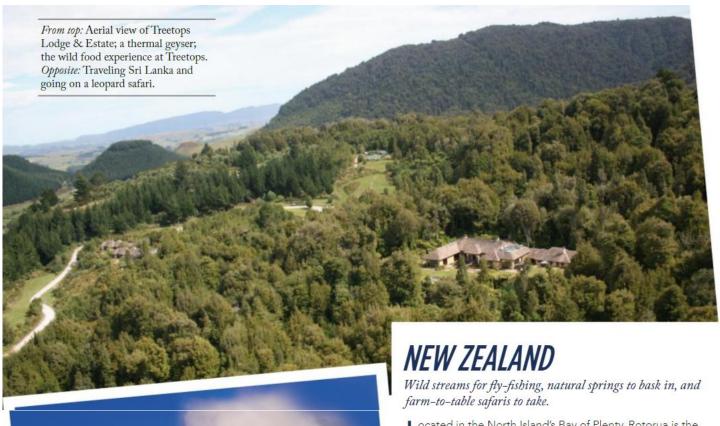

hidden within a 25,000-acre native forest has immediate access to the country's best fly-fishing. The recently refurbished lodge has a handsome, ecologically inspired design that brings in the surrounding forest. Treetops takes "eating local" to new extremes with its Estate-to-Plate 4WD Safari across the lodge's all-organic, pesticide-free kitchen gardens accompanied by wild food chefs. After gathering indigenous and seasonal veggies, the chef will give a private cooking lesson in the forest, preparing signature New Zealand dishes such as freshly caught trout and crayfish.
